From the Pastor's Desk...

My Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Every time I go to the cupboard to grab one of my mother's plates, I remember the day that we watched these very dishes being made. We were on a family trip, and one of the stops was at a pottery house called Iron Mountain Stoneware. We watched as artisans shaped each plate, bowl, and cup on a potter's wheel. And, after these creations had dried in kilns, they were hand-dipped in paint, so that each dish in the place setting bore a unique design. Even though my mom's dishes are chipped with age, I still cherish them, in part, because I was able to witness the laborious efforts that it took to create them.

In ancient Israel, during both the Iron and Bronze Ages, working with clay was vital to the community. Pots were important for storing food and drink, for lamps, for tableware, and for cookware. Pottery, once fired, lasted a lifetime and was amazingly durable. Even today, one of the first things archaeologists find in any dig of an ancient site is pottery shards. A potter was an important trade.

Creating a piece of pottery began with softening and preparing the clay. Because the clay had to be dug up, there was a need to first remove impurities, along with foreign objects. The clay would then be tempered and kneaded. Assistants to the potter would knead with their feet until the clay became soft and pliable. Next, the potter would take it and shape it on a double wheel, made of stone and wood. With just the right amount of water, the potter would shape the clay until the desired object was created. The potter would then allow it to dry until it became hard and leathery. At that point, it would be fired in the kiln. Once "tried" by fire, the piece would become hard and strong.

If the potter didn't like the piece, if it didn't come out the way it was intended, or if the potter wanted to re-form it differently, the potter could simply de-form it, re-knead it, or re-water it, and the clay would be good as new. You see, that's the "secret" of clay. It can always be remade. No matter how hard it gets, whether it cracks into a hundred pieces, whether it's a decade old, or whether it's been used and discarded, that clay can always be softened, watered, and re-formed into whatever the potter desires. Clay is always restorable. The potter decides its fate.

So, today, my good news for you is that your life is not set in stone. Your past does not have to dictate your life, your success, or your happiness. With God, you always have a perpetual second chance. At least, that's how I'm reading Jeremiah 18:1-11. You know, the one about Jeremiah going to the potter's house. In this scripture, God is the potter, and "the house of Israel" is the clay. So, yes, I am stretching theologically, but I would submit that when we become disciples of Jesus Christ, we sign up to let God take the wheel — the potter's wheel — so that we might be molded, re-formed, re-imaged, re-born into the kind of disciple who could carry out God's most dangerous and exciting mission. Whether God restores us, whether God changes us, or whether God puts us out to dry depends upon our needs, our resistance, and His hopes for us in the world.

My prayer for you this day is found in that old, familiar hymn, "Have Thine Own Way..."



Have thine own way, Lord, have thine own way, Thou art the Potter, I am the Clay, Mold me and make me after thy will, While I am waiting, yielded and still.

Updates

There has been a little confusion about this next round of Covid booster shots, concerning who is eligible to receive one and when. According to the pharmacy at the Damascus Safeway, an adult of any age can get their third booster as soon as two months after their second booster. Therefore, any adult who had their last booster shot before August 1 is now eligible.

The U.S Food and Drug Administration has determined that the shelf-life of most at-home Covid test kits is at least six to nine months longer than it first thought. Therefore, it has extended the expiration dates on many kits, so if you have test kits in your homes and the expiration dates have passed, do **not** throw them out yet. Instead, visit this website and see if your kit's shelf life has been extended...
