

From the Desk of Pastor Nick ...

November is here once again. The leaves are turning beautiful shades of red, yellow, orange, and then finally a dull brown. I love this time of year! Football is in full swing on both Saturday and Sunday. But as I watch

football, there is one thing that drives me crazy every year at this time, and that's the political ads. Thankfully, we are not in a presidential election year; for in those years, the ads really go insane. I have grown weary of watching those ads while I am trying to keep up with the game. It seems like during every commercial break, we hear about this political leader's bad ideas from his/her opponent. Then, we hear how the opponent is a terrible human being who is pushing all these bad programs.

Now, you may be starting to worry that I am going to wander off and try to convince you to vote one way or another this coming election day. Fear not. I wouldn't dare try to tell you who to vote for or who not to vote for. I hope to talk today about a different kind of political figure — one who has never asked for your vote and has no plans to run for any political office.

Every November, we draw close to the end of the Church's liturgical year. On the last Sunday of the liturgical year, we gather to celebrate the most important political figure who ever lived. We gather to celebrate and worship a sovereign King who rules the universe. The last Sunday of Church's year is dedicated to Christ the King. It is the one Sunday of the year that the Church dips its toe into the political world and reminds itself that we serve the One who claims the political title of King of the Universe.

Why do we proclaim that Jesus is King of the Universe? Because the Angel Gabriel appeared to Mary and proclaimed, "Behold, you will conceive... and the Lord God will give Him the throne of David, and He will rule over the House of Jacob forever and of His Kingdom there will be no end." Paul also writes that Jesus is "King of Kings and Lord of Lords." (*1 Timothy* 6)

Finally, the most spectacular depiction of this eternal King comes from the Book of Revelation. In chapter 5, John observes that there is a scroll that cannot be opened by anyone on Earth or under Earth or in Heaven. We find from the last book of the Bible that this scroll contains the blueprints to set the cosmos back into the harmony God intended for all creation. But one of the elders tells John to not worry, the Lion of the Tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered, so that He can open the scroll. John then looks and sees a broken, bleeding, sacrificed lamb; a figure that represents weakness and helplessness. In a dramatic turn of imagery, John reminds us that this conquering Lion is the broken and bleeding, crucified lamb. This small broken animal represents the power of God to rule the universe and set the world right again. Not because He is a fierce lion that crushes the bones...

Administrative Council Meeting

Sunday, October 16, 2022

The meeting was opened by Bob at 12:15 pm.

In Attendance:

Steven Arndt, Louise Burdette, Bob Burke, Cathy Burke, Linda Chatterton, Pastor Karen Davis, Jim Kemp, Becky Lewis, Brian Lewis, Carol Stone, and Pastor Nick Works.

Absent – Judy Hughes, Rick & Tammy Monarch, but all three gave yes votes to Bob before the meeting.

Rental House:

Trustees have requested an additional \$40,000 to complete repairs. Details follow:

- New oil burning furnace has been installed.
- Upstairs bathroom faucet, toilet, and tub drain are being replaced, and tub will be refinished.
- Environmental Septic will pump annually for the next two years and determine frequency going forward.
- Fireplace chimney insert will be replaced with a more efficient one.
- Windows will be replaced with vinyl and exterior trim will be wrapped in no-maintenance aluminum.
- Kitchen cabinets, countertops, all appliances, and plumbing have been replaced.
- Wood floors will be refinished and new carpet installed.
- One Mitsubishi Mini Split A/C and Hyper Heat will be installed on each floor with an exterior unit on the side of the house.

The Finance Committee has approved the availability of the needed funds. A motion to approve this request was made by Linda, seconded by Jim, and passed without dissent.

Parsonage:

- Sewage water in the basement was due to cracked cast iron piping and a broken wet vent tee.
- Environmental Septic pumped the tank and installed a riser. Tank will be pumped annually for the next two years and re-evaluated in 2024.
- Estimates to address the piping issues have been solicited from two companies. One estimate of \$5,500 has been received. The Board of Trustees will make an award after receipt of the second estimate.

Bob adjourned the meeting at 12:45 pm.




