"For surely I know the plans I have for you," says the Lord, "plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with **hope**." ~~~ Jeremiah 29:11 ~~~

In 2019, a new term entered the Collins English Dictionary: "hopepunk." It is defined as "a literary and artistic movement that celebrates the pursuit of positive aims in the face of adversity." Hopepunk emerged during bleak sociopolitical times (pandemic, climate change, economic, and geopolitical crises), which gave it a greater appeal to readers. Coined in 2017 by fantasy author Alexandra Rowland, hopepunk was a reaction to a different kind of writing dominating the market that year, a genre that Rowland and others refer to as "grimdark." Grimdark emphasizes the cruelty that so often defines human interaction. Rowland writes that, in contrast, "hopepunk says that *genuinely and sincerely* caring about something, anything, requires bravery and strength. It's about demanding a better, kinder world, and truly believing that we can get there if we care about each other as hard as we possibly can." (*Hope, "HopePunk," and the Gospel — BreakPoint*)

The essence of the hopepunk philosophy can be found in an exchange between Frodo and Samwise Gamgee in *The Two Towers* from Peter Jackson's "Lord of the Rings" films, as they struggle against the forces of evil around them...

"It's like in the great stories, Mr. Frodo," Sam says. "Full of darkness and danger they were. And sometimes you didn't want to know the end. Because how could the end be happy? How could the world go back to the way it was when so much bad had happened? But in the end, it's only a passing thing, this shadow. Even darkness must pass. A new day will come. And when the Sun shines, it will shine out clearer."

"What are we holding on to, Sam?" Frodo then asks.

"That there's some good in this world, Mr. Frodo... and it's worth fighting for," his friend replies.

In a world often characterized by cynicism and despair, the emergence of hopepunk offers a refreshing perspective on how to navigate through challenging times. But I would submit that hopepunk's ideology of proactive optimism and resilience finds a deep resonance with the teachings and values of Christianity. Christianity encourages us to cultivate radical hope in the face of despair, mirroring the hopeful resistance of hopepunk. Both Christianity and hopepunk call for active engagement with the world, offering a counter-narrative to passivity and resignation. And both encourage individuals to stand up for justice, embrace vulnerability, and build a better future, no matter how bleak one's present circumstances may seem.

Hopepunk's emphasis on radical hope, social justice, empowering vulnerability, and community building aligns with the principles that guide us as Christians. Perhaps, by embracing hopepunk's ethos and combining it with the spiritual foundations of Christianity, we can find a renewed sense of purpose, strength, and inspiration to navigate the complexities of life and contribute to a more just and hopeful world.
