From the Pastor's Desk...

My Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We are Story People. We love stories. That's why we go to movies, read books, and listen to our friends recount their experiences. There's nothing better than a good tale or a whisper. We love to hear about people and faraway places and exciting adventures and funny mistakes. But I think we also love to hear stories about ourselves.

Every year, on my birthday, I look forward to my mother re-telling the story of the day that I was born. Whenever someone says, "One time when you were little…", we all lean in a little closer and smile a little bigger. We love to hear about how we did things in our pasts. By sharing stories, we learn about ourselves. Stories can be very powerful.

Teachers use the technique of storytelling to make difficult concepts easier for us to process. Jesus told stories, called parables, for that very reason – and also to help us understand how God wants us to live our lives.

In the story of the Good Samaritan, a very smart man asks Jesus, "Who is my neighbor?" Now, we all know that Jesus could have simply said, "Everyone." But instead, He involves **us** by telling a story – probably the most remembered of all His many stories – The Parable of the Good Samaritan.

Once upon a time, a man went down the road to Jericho. He was attacked by robbers who stole from him, beat him, and left him wounded on the side of the road. Soon after, a man from his church came down the road, but crossed to the other side to avoid helping; next, a man from his town came down the road, but he also crossed to the other side to avoid helping; then, an unknown man from a faraway town came down the road. Not only did this foreigner bind up the man's wounds, he also took him to an inn, cared for him, and left enough money for the innkeeper to continue caring for him.

Just like all of us, the people listening to Jesus back then knew which character in the story acted like a neighbor. But I wonder if you noticed that Jesus **did not name us** in the story. He did not say, "One time, **you** were going down the road," or "One time, **you** saw a man lying on the road." No, Jesus doesn't tell us which character we are. He lets us figure that out ourselves and decide who we want to be in the story and who we want to be in our world.

In the Good Samaritan and in each of His other stories, Jesus helps us learn about ourselves, giving us the power to choose how to live the stories of our lives. Which leads me to wonder... Who will you choose to be in the story of your life?

Suggestions for Keeping Cool & Safe in Extreme Heat

Keep Your Body Temperature Down

This is your #1 priority during a heat wave.

- 1. **Stay Hydrated** Drinking lots of water is the best way to keep your body temperature down. Stay away from sugary, alcoholic, or caffeinated drinks. All of these drinks dehydrate you, even if they are icy cold.
- 2. **Keep Lotions & Sunscreens in the Fridge** They will feel more soothing and cooling when you apply them. This will also prevent them from getting too hot and losing their proper consistency.
- 3. **Ice Down Your Fan** Placing a bowl of ice in front of a fan will blow cooler air throughout the room until all the ice melts. This is a cheap and easy way to make a room a little cooler.
- 4. **Close Your Blinds & Curtains** Keeping the sun out of your home will help it to stay several degrees cooler.
- 5. **Use Cold Compresses on Pressure Points** Keep wet cloths or sponges in plastic bags in the fridge or freezer. Your neck, wrists, head, feet, and ankles are all places which help to cool your whole body.
- 6. **Run Your Appliances at Night** Dishwashers, dryers, and ovens all increase the temperature in your home. Save these chores for night when it's cooler, and use your outside grill as much as possible.
- 7. **Live in the Lower Floors** Since heat rises, basements and lower levels are usually cooler, so live (and maybe even sleep!) there as much as possible.
- 8. **Wear Cotton & Lighter Colors** Stay away from darker colors which absorb heat, and wear lighter fabrics like cotton that can breathe.
- 9. **Stay Out of the Sun & Use Sunscreen -** Wear a hat, and stay in the shade or under an umbrella. This will keep your body cooler and help you to avoid getting a sunburn that will make you feel hotter and more uncomfortable.
- 10. **Turn on Your Car's AC before Getting In** Many cars now have this option on their electronic key fobs. Some newer cars even have cooling seats.

Congregant Spotlight Returns!

Note from the Editor: This month, and in future months, we are bringing back the Congregant Spotlight that we used to include in our monthly newsletters. I want to thank Linda for being willing to be the first person to highlight in this new series. She took this very seriously and provided us with a wealth of information about herself, her family, and her background. All of us at WG appreciate this and are extremely grateful to have both she and Steven as part of our incredible Wesley Grove church family!

Linda's father, Charles, was of Brazilian descent although he was born in New York City. Her mother, Carol, was a Canadian citizen raised by British citizens who had immigrated to Canada. Born on March 4, 1954, in New York City, Linda had two older brothers, who were identical twins, Stephen and Paul. Early in her life, her family "escaped" the city and moved to New Hampshire, where her parents had honeymooned some years earlier. Linda's sister, Holly, was born six years later.

Linda sailed through school and graduated from her small regional high school. With the continuous influence of the big city (due to many return trips with her family), she decided to spread her wings and travel. In the summer of her junior year, her parents encouraged her to attend a performance by a group called *Up* With People (UWP), and by intermission of the show, Linda knew this group was in her immediate future. Two weeks after her high school graduation, she left home and joined UWP, which is an international group of young people who travel globally and project unity through diversity their performances. During her year on the road, UWP toured New England, then on to Europe for the 1972 Munich Olympics (quite the experience!), and spent a couple of months in Spain. Linda returned home and saw her family briefly for Christmas, then went back out on tour in Mexico, the United States, and Canada before ending with their final performance at Boston Symphony Hall. During this year, she had tutors and completed her freshman year of college. In every city that they visited, they stayed in the homes of residents and learned a great deal about culture and how various people lived their lives. This was an incredible education, and Linda still enjoys a relationship with this special organization today.

On the road, Linda enjoyed the excitement of performing, but realized her true interest and strengths were in business. She attended three years at the University of Arizona (Tucson) and graduated with a business degree, majoring in marketing and minoring in communications. She worked full time for UWP's home office in Tucson while attending college. Linda then went to work for American Hospital Supply, a large corporation, while living in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area and selling supplies to hospitals. Becoming a sales professional and living on straight commission was a challenge. Linda transferred to Jackson, Tenn., and then a few years later to Baltimore. (This move was prompted by a cross placed in her vard after Linda confronted the KKK at an event in McNairy County.) She was glad to be back into city life and quickly immersed herself in the many opportunities available there - symphony, theater, shows, and concerts. She also met and dated one of the Baltimore Colts for a couple of years.

Linda was living the high life – flying to out-of-town games, vacationing in the Bahamas multiple times a year (having met a special man there too!), and earning a substantial living. She lived in Cross Keys, which at that time was a very exclusive neighborhood in Baltimore – and then bought her own home. She also attended the University of Baltimore where she earned an MBA. At this same time, Linda was a silent partner in her best friend's (Jennifer) boutique – "Fit to Be Tried" – one of the first stores for plus -sized women before there was recognition of such a need. This meant that she got to travel regularly to Tucson, AZ and to California for the

big buying markets to select inventory for the store with Jennifer. It was fun working with Danskin and Catalina Swimwear and convincing them that if they made the clothes in larger sizes, ladies would wear them. They were right for these sales compose a major portion of retail sales today.

But all good things come to end, and Linda became depressed, dangerously so. She was hospitalized multiple times after several suicide attempts. She spent months as an inpatient at Johns Hopkins undergoing various therapies. She lost her job and was unemployed for some time. After about two years, Linda returned to work as a purchasing agent for Hopkins at what was then Baltimore City Hospital. She certainly knew the pricing and inventory, and being back to work (although at half the previous income) felt like a slow start to a new beginning.

Linda was quickly promoted until she was the General Services Administrator and then went to the University of Maryland Medical System as Director of Operations. A move to Kernan Hospital as the Chief Operation Officer brought her in contact with "Homicide," a 1990's NBC-TV production. The Kernan campus had an old mansion that needed to be renovated, but the hospital had no money to do so. So, Linda "sold" the TV production company on using Kernan as a shooting site and made the money for the renovations – she also had a lot of fun with the cast and crew!

Eventually, Linda left the world of hospitals to become the CEO of Orthopedics of Central Maryland and grew that group of physicians to twice its size, adding a surgicenter and other services. During these years, she also taught graduate level courses at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia and Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore. At about the same time, Linda became involved in a project involving multiple physicians' practices – she helped them to raise the money to design, build, and occupy their own medical office building. This whole project was a labor of love, and eventually very successful overall, since this building sold last fall for six times its original cost after just

seven years. Linda still serves on this board today.

Service is something sacred to Linda and her family. Her father was a WWII veteran, and both brothers were drafted during the Vietnam War. Paul went to Vietnam, was shot by friendly fire, and sustained injuries that followed him for the rest of his life. Too old to join the national branches, Linda instead was sworn into the Maryland State Guard (a subsidiary of the Maryland National Guard) as a captain in the 10th Medical Regiment. After two years, she switched to the 121st Engineer Regiment due to her project management experience and left after 11 years of service as a LTC. It was there that she met a man, "Col. Stuffy" - who was to change her life in magnificent ways. Col. Arndt was similarly patriotic, and they shared similar values. Although he was her commanding officer, and after hinting around for ages, she asked him out for dinner. Linda was simply looking for someone to do things with, to have fun with, a companion.

Years earlier in her life (when she was still a senior in high school), Linda decided that she never wanted children and didn't see any point in being married. She proceeded in this manner - having fun and relationships, but breaking them off when they got too serious. Col. Arndt wanted a wife and had to work hard to first gain the support of her family and best friends (traveling to New Hampshire and Arizona to do so) before he proposed. It took some time and lots of long discussions. Linda's sister told him to wait even longer as she knew Linda would turn him down. Finally, Holly gave the go-ahead, Steven proposed in front of the Regiment, and Linda said yes. They will be married six years this November and couldn't be happier! They have been very fortunate to be healthy and able to travel to Europe, Korea, China, and all over the U.S. Linda has also been to both Australia and Brazil.

She knows how fortunate she is to have come through her mental illness successfully and still be managing it to this day. Linda is even more fortunate to have married Steven, moved here to Damascus, and discovered her new extended family here at Wesley Grove United Methodist Church!
