From the Pastor's Desk...

When the calendar turns to the month of November, magical things start to happen. The leaves change from green to yellow to gold to orange to red and then on to brown. Brilliant purple, red, yellow, and orange mums start popping up on my deck. (Magically, of course, since I personally don't buy them or plant them!) Big purple heads of cabbage are magically planted around the house. I have often wondered if I have a Carla gnome at my house. The days are getting shorter as it begins to be get dark about 5:30, and by 6, it's completely dark outside. And the temperatures... Well, it's chilly in the morning, but warm in the afternoon. College football is in full swing, and college basketball is just taking off. love putting on an old flannel shirt and a warm vest and spending a few hours outside in the cool fall air. The month of November is my favorite month --- I just love the fall!

November is also the month of my favorite holiday --- Thanksgiving. So many people love Christmas, but for my money, Thanksgiving is the best. Carla and I established a tradition in our family that dates to our early days together in Fort Worth, Texas. I worked at a church which had both a Thanksgiving Eve service and a Sunday morning service, so we didn't have enough time to drive home to Arkansas to spend time with our extended families. That meant that Carla and I stayed in Fort Worth and spent time with other young seminarian couples. Together, we all had a huge feast on Thanksgiving Day, and then we all watched football. It is literally the only day of the year other than Super Bowl Sunday that I actually sit down and watch the NFL. Later that evening, we would go to the movies together. So for years now, going to the movies on Thanksgiving Day has been a tradition in the Works household. Both of our kids watched their first movies in theaters on Thanksgiving Day. One year, Carla and I went to watch *Toy Story 2*, another year we took both our kids to see *Moana*, and one year, we went to see *How the Grinch Stole Christmas*.

Although all those things make Thanksgiving Day special for me, I think the thing that makes this holiday the most special is that it has always been a time to take four days off to spend with my family, and just relax, and think about how grateful to God I am for all that He has blessed me with. Christmas is such a crazy time of year — buying and wrapping presents, decorating the house, the yard, the tree, flying or driving to Arkansas, and then taking all those decorations down again. Christmas can truly wear you out, but Thanksgiving is a time just to rest, relax, and be thankful — it's four simple days to slow down and think about God's graciousness.

In the Old Testament, there is a harvest festival a lot like our Thanksgiving Holiday. Shavuot is this festival that roughly equates to Thanksgiving. It's also called the Festival of Weeks. Farmers would tie a ribbon around the first fruit of wheat to appear in their fields. Then, at harvest time, they'd trim those



first fruits of wheat and offer them as offerings to our God. By the time of Jesus, this was one of the three most important pilgrimage festivals. Families would collect their first fruits of wheat, journey to Jerusalem, and then offer these to the Lord in the Temple. They would also take time to express how thankful they were that God had given them the Law. The Festival of Shavuot commemorates the giving of the five Books of Moses. You can read about this festival in Leviticus 23 and in Deuteronomy 16.

The other thing about this festival is that it foreshadows the Coming of the Messiah. Traditionally, in Jewish synagogues, the Book of Ruth is read aloud on this day. Ruth is the great grandmother of King David. This was a symbolic statement from the synagogue communities that they were awaiting the arrival of the Son of David. Our harvest festival of Thanksgiving is also a festival where we begin to wait on the arrival of the Son of David. Traditionally, the Christmas Season begins the day after Thanksgiving, and in most years. Advent officially begins the Sunday after Thanksgiving. In this special season, we as Christians also begin to wait for the Coming of the Messiah.



So, as November gathers steam, remember to set aside a little time to rest, relax, and focus on how grateful you are to God for all His many blessings and to prepare yourself for the

Coming of the Son of David in our midst for Advent is right around the corner. Thanks be to God.

Finance News

An annual budget is a monetary plan. It's the amount of money you think you will need to pay for all of your expenses in the coming year. The other part of this plan is to know that there will be enough income to pay those expenses and from where that income will come. Then, you keep track throughout the year to make sure your spending is at or under your budget. If it is over in any one category, you try to spend less elsewhere to make up that difference.

All of our church committees submitted their 2022 budget requests to the Finance Committee with very few changes from 2021. A few dollars were cut, and others reallocated, such that our overall 2022 church budget is only about \$5,000 more than this year's.

In both 2020 and 2021, our expenses have been well below budget, which is a good thing, because our income has also been lower than what we expected to receive.

How do we have income, and from where does it come? Naturally, one source is our individual contributions to this church. We also have monthly income from the rental of the land for the flagpole cell phone tower and the rental house between the church and the fellowship hall. But this is never enough money to fund all of our annual budget, so we also hold a variety of fundraisers during the year: turkey & oyster dinners, community yard sales, food booth at the Montgomery County Harvest Festival, biweekly Lions Club dinners, DVFD annual banquet, and our annual craft bazaar. Due to Covid-19, we have only had one yard sale, a few Lions Club dinners, and the fall craft sale this year.

Over the next few years, we will be challenged to bring in enough money to cover our budget and all of our essential needs. As we lose members, there will be less coming in. Our turkey and oyster dinners are probably a thing of the past because the ingredients have gotten so expensive, and we barely have enough people to continue to do all the work that is involved. And we don't know the future of the County's Harvest Festival.

Let us conclude by saying that although we are not in dire straits, we do all need to think, and pray, as to how to increase the income for our church. It's going to take every one of us to make our church finances continue to work. The Finance Committee is open to suggestions. Please see any one of us if you have any ideas or thoughts to share. Thanks to all of you in advance for your extra thought and consideration of this very important matter.
