
The Power and Endurance of a Small Group of Faithful Believers

Imagine a small gathering of people who gather for worship on a regular basis. Say 15 to 20 folks. Can you see a group like that in your mind? Now, imagine they live during a time of division and great unrest. Due to the onset of new technologies, the old political structures are beginning to fragment. This community also lives during a time when Christianity is beginning to wane, and the Church struggles to capture the imagination of most of the people who live around this religious community. Imagine that this religious community has no couples that are of childbearing age, and there are only a couple of younger community members. Do you think this group has reason to question whether they will be around in 15 or 20 years? Do you think it might be understandable if they wonder what God may have in store for them as they seek to live as disciples in their world? Maybe they are uneasy about their future, maybe they understand that they are in a precarious position, and maybe they are right to ask questions about how their mission will impact their future.

Last month, I visited a small religious community in a remote area of Scotland. It was birthed during a truly dangerous time in history with a small group of fifteen members. The monastery at Iona began in the year 563 when its founder, St. Columba of Ireland, had grown tired of the constant political unrest in that country. So, he took a small group of followers and relocated to the small island of Iona to escape political division and re-center their lives around the worship of God and devotion to the work of God in their midst.

Rather than shrivel into obscurity as members succumbed to old age and disinterest, Iona reignited a religious awakening in Britain. The island had been solidly Christian until the Roman Empire withdrew, and the populace reverted to mild paganism. But with the advent of the Iona community and its re-centering on the worship and work of God, Christianity rebounded in Britain for the next 1500 years. When I visited Iona, I drew inspiration that a small group of believers, even a group with no prospects of rejuvenation through birthrates, can lead to a spiritual reawakening simply by being dedicated to the worship of God and being committed to living faithfully with God.

I know that some of us are worried about what our place is in the future of Christianity in our world, but Iona proves to us that God can move and work powerfully in small religious communities. We must trust Him and pray we have the courage to live our lives as faithful believers. I don't think St. Columba went to Iona to begin a religious reawakening; instead, I think he went there to live a faithful life. That must be our goal. We can then leave our legacy to The One who makes legacies: God Almighty.



This is St. Martin's Cross, located outside the Great Abbey of Iona. It has stood on this very spot for the last 1200 years and tells the story of the community of Iona and the Biblical characters from which it drew inspiration.
